








There may be times when we have fallen behind. We may experience set backs, sometimes through no fault of our own. We may even be tempted to give up.

But when those feelings won't go away and they start to really affect day-to-day life, that is when there can be a problem.







Last weekend about 200 million people around the world are estimated to have watched the final of the annual contest which sees 26 nations compete in the live extravaganza that is the Eurovision Song Contest!









The first ever Eurovision Song Contest took place on 24 May 1956, when just seven countries took part.

The idea for the contest was put forward by a man called Marcel Bezencon who worked for the European Broadcasting Union (EBU).

The UK, France, Germany, Spain and Italy (called the 'big five') all go straight through to the final as they give the most money to the EBU.





The previous year's winner also goes straight through and usually hosts the next contest.







Even though it's not in Europe, Australia has been in the competition since 2015. They were originally invited as part of the 60th anniversary and they've stuck around ever since.









Israel, who hosted this year's Eurovision - is also not geographically in Europe.

Despite this, it's been part of the competition since 1973.

The winner of the Eurovision Song Contest is decided by all of the countries involved, with each nation getting to award points to the other countries that they want to win.

Results are often controversial as some people suspect that countries exchange votes with their neighbours and political alliances instead of voting for the best song.








The UK have been runners up 15 times before and won the contest five times.








# 'Miracle' man survives flesh eating disease after family say goodbye to him in coma

He went in to hospital with an aching leg but things soon got much worse

This week we are celebrating our school values displayed not just at the academy but by our family members at home.

This reflection was written by Ilfracombe student Freya Barnes about her dad Richard.

- On 10th June Richard went into A&E with an aching Leg and was quickly rushed into surgery to have his leg amputated from the hip because of a flesh eating disease called Necrotising Fasciitis
- This became more complicated when the doctors found, from the blood tests, he also had rare form of Leukaemia.
- He stayed in a coma for a total of three weeks- causing complete muscle loss, which takes a very long time to build back up.
- During this time there were many other complications like...







**Tracheotomy-** This is when you have a hole put in your throat because you are unable to breath independently, it also means you cannot talk, whilst you have it

**Sepsis-** doctors were worried they would have to amputate his other leg and right arm (luckily it never came to this!)

A stroke- causing him to temporarily lose the use of his left arm and he couldn't eat for 4 months due to the muscles in his throat not working

A massive brain swelling (called PRES syndrome)- Again very rare, causing him to have a seizer, this was when doctors said there was no hope left. He spent another week in sedation and even after it became clear this wasn't going to kill him, there was still a possibility of brain damage or blindness.







#### But he defied all the odds!!!

















Richard Barns came home on 13th August 2018, even though the doctors warned us not to expect him home before Christmas.

He had chemotherapy in September to treat the leukaemia but unfortunately this led to another week in hospital because he got neutropenic sepsis.

This is when you get an infection but have no immune system to fight it, this alone only has a 50% survival rate.









Lots of physiotherapy later and a new prosthetic leg, Richard is now completely healthy, drug free, driving and back at work.



Since this reflection our school community has responded to medical research by consulting with students, staff, parents and other local schools. We have taken steps to help us all to manage our screen time.








This year the Government published its first guidance on limiting children's screen time.

The advice — such as taking a break at least every two hours and avoiding social media before bedtime — follows concerns about the harm being done to young people.











Here are some of the government recommendations.

#### What do you think?

- Phones and mobile devices should not be used at the dinner table - talking as a family is very important for development.
- Keep screens out of the bedroom at bedtime.
- Take a break from screens every two hours by getting up and being active
- Parents should model appropriate screen time and never assume their children are happy for pictures to be shared.



Winston Churchill once said we shape buildings and then they shape us. What do you think he meant by this?

The Notre-Dame Cathedral is the most popular tourist destination within Paris itself, visited by over 14 million people per year.

The building has historical significance. French Emperor Napoleon Bonaparte held his coronation at the Cathedral. The church has inspired some incredible characters, such as Quasimodo in The Hunchback of Notre-Dame created by French novelist Victor Hugo in 1831.







On the15th April 2019 a huge fire engulfed the medieval cathedral of Notre-Dame in Paris, one of France's most famous landmarks.















The fire began at around 6.30pm (local time) and quickly reached the roof of the cathedral, destroying its stained-glass windows and the wooden interior before toppling the spire.











Thousands of people gathered in the streets around the cathedral, observing the flames in silence. Some could be seen openly crying, while others sang hymns or said prayers.

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
